Aim of the SDG 8 project

To examine how universities in different regions of the African continent integrate the UN SDG 8

- 'Promoting decent work and sustainable economic development'
- into the curricula of their study programs
- how the universities take SDG 8 into account beyond the study programs (whole university approach)

Study design

- Short questionnaire with header data and technical information (EvaSys)
- Semi-structured expert interviews (interview guide)
- Ethical approval by the Ethics Committee of the DGUV on 13 May 2024
- The universities interviewed were selected on the basis of existing Master- and PhD programs relevant to health, safety and well-being at work and their regional representativeness

Data analysis

- Analysis of the study data with the help of MAXQDA
- Qualitative content analysis
 - Transfer of key-elements of SDG 8 into teaching objectives
 - Training methods (e.g., lectures, hybrid teaching, student-led learning, case studies, practical visits, integrating indigenous knowledge, interdisciplinary teaching)
 - Practical implications (e.g., practical training program, implementing the competences of graduated students in their future professional life)

- Program leaders and lecturers at universities from 7 countries in 4 sub-regions of the African continent
 - Botswana
 - Democratic Republic Congo
 - Ghana
 - Kenya
 - Nigeria
 - South Africa
 - Zimbabwe





Study programs

- Study programs in Occupational Health (e.g., Master of Medicine, Postgraduate program Occupational Medicine)
- Study programs in Human Resource Development (e.g., MBA Health Management, Master Public Health, Master in Human Capital Development)
- Study programs on Environmental Science (e.g. Environmental Health, Environmental Economics and Policy)





Whole university approach

- Routine occupational safety training
- Training on psychological and mental health (students and staff)
- Mentorship, counselling
- Special role of nursing sciences
- Special departments for health and safety on campus
- Collaboration with other, experienced universities in the field
- Collaboration with external institutions on issues in the field
- SDG 8 as part of the universities' mission (e.g. create good work for all)





Benefits of the study

- To learn from the integration of SDG 8 at African universities
- To promote the development of study programs that improve decent work and sustainable economic development in Africa
- To identify facilitating and hindering factors for creating good work and good health for all
- To provide an impetus for improved continental and international networking on decent work and sustainable economic development
